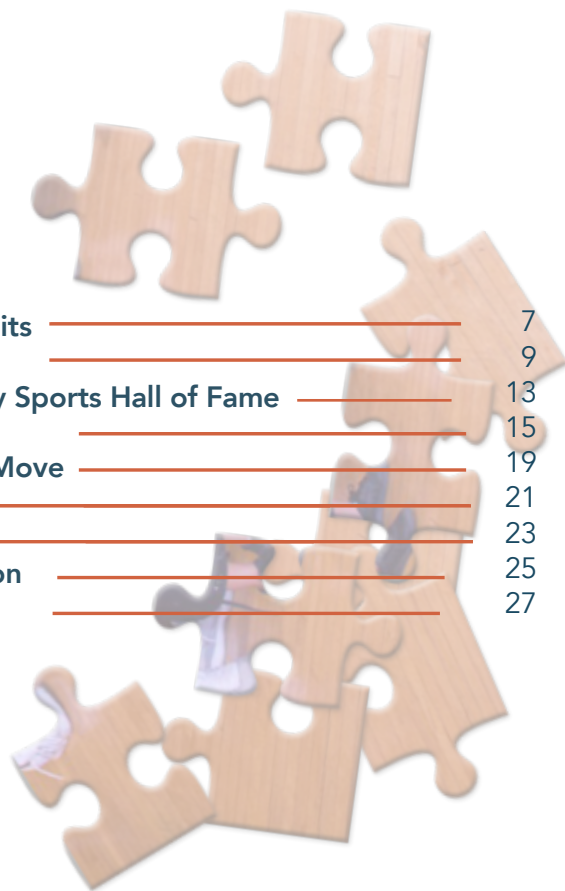

As always, one of our top priorities was care and improvement of our most valuable asset, the Castle Museum building. Interior, exterior, and security system repairs and upgrades were all accomplished in 2018, and a long list awaits for 2019, as we exert every effort to continue our stewardship of this architectural and cultural gem.

Telling the story of the people of Saginaw County is a vital component of our mission. In July 2018, we opened a new permanent exhibit in the lower level, "Timber!!: Lumbering in the Saginaw Valley," an absolutely vital piece of our community history, one which served to define the early industrial and financial growth of the area. Work continues on two additional permanent exhibits, "Coal Mining" and "Early European Contact." In 2019, these finished exhibits will complete a major renovation of over 3,600 sq. ft. in the lower level. We also showcased 13 temporary exhibits throughout the year highlighting fascinating history and culture relevant to our community members. Additional plans for 2019 include a complete reimagining of our award-winning "History on the Move" educational program, which takes history on the road, free of charge.

Sound financial planning and careful spending allowed us to finish the year under budget, while accomplishing all of our Strategic Plan goals and maintaining our vast collection of over 150,000 items. Yet much uncertainty looms in our future, as the current county-wide millage under which we now operate is set to expire in 2020. Without that millage, the Castle Museum will cease to exist. We need our entire membership, Board of Directors, staff, and legion of friends to **get connected** and unite behind the Castle Museum as we educate the public on the importance of this vital institution. Thank you again for your past support, and we humbly ask you to continue it as we work together to tell the ever evolving story of the people of Saginaw County.

A COLLECTION THAT *Continues to Grow*

A collection is never complete. In 2018, we had over 150 accessions – individual donations – added to the collection. While our community is generous, we are careful to only accept items that help us tell the story of Saginaw and its people. Each item is carefully researched and vetted. After the Collections Committee reviews the items, the HSSC Board of Directors accepts them into the collection.

Here are a few of the notable objects added to our collection:

A **canoe paddle** made by Chief David Shoppengon. Shoppengon was born near Greenpoint in Saginaw in the early nineteenth century. This paddle was a gift from Shoppengon to a Saginaw resident, Edwin David Church, in 1908.

A **photograph** capturing a Saginaw Halloween celebration in 1909. The image is complete with a listing of the names of each of the young women who attended this party at 123 Owen St. in Saginaw.

A **knitting machine** used at Frankenmuth Knitting Mills during WWI. This

machine was one of many used at the company to help produce 66,000 pairs of socks for the military.



The Castle Annex houses the museum's collection.



A **chrome and marble coffee table** designed by Florence Schust Knoll Bassett. Born in Saginaw in 1917, she is the daughter of a founder of Saginaw's Schust Bakery. Florence would become an internationally acclaimed furniture designer.

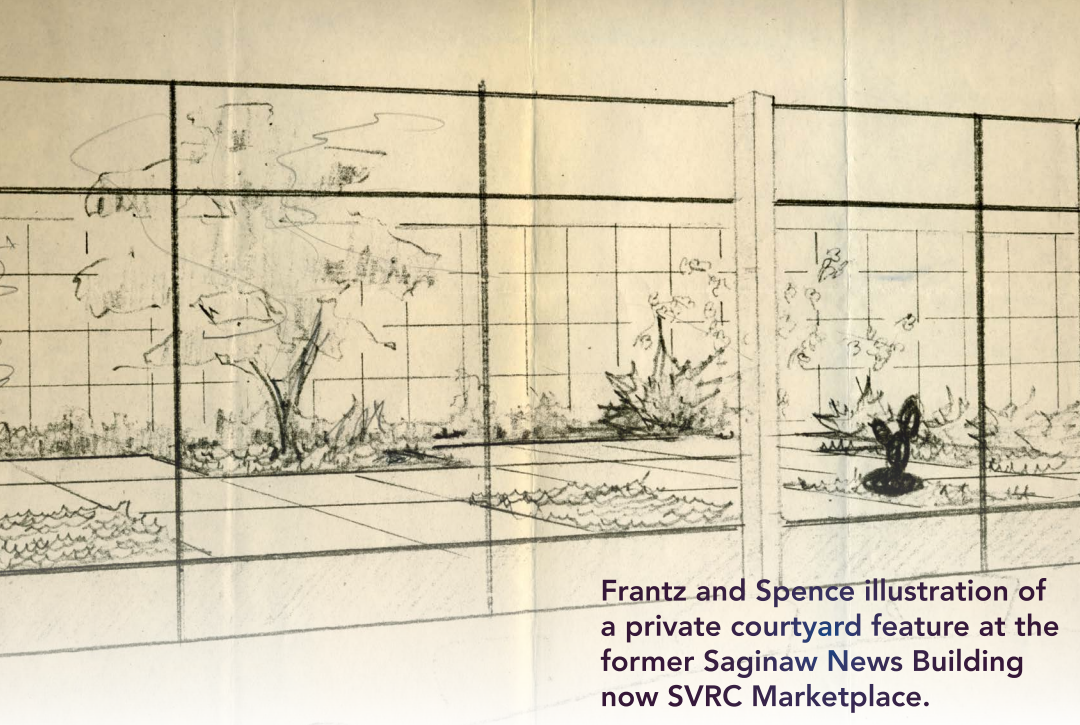
The **car** that won Saginaw's 1965 Soap Box Derby.

A **model** of the Medical Building at Gray Iron Foundry presented to Dr. Richard D. Mudd when he retired.

Architectural drawings by Saginaw Architect Glenn Beach. The collection includes designs for residences, churches and commercial buildings by the well-known Saginaw architect.

Although it highlights only a few of the objects donated in 2018, this list suggests the breadth of acquisitions and the way that each of the objects helps to preserve a unique story that is a part of Saginaw County's rich heritage.

HOW DOES THE COMMUNITY *Use Our Collection?*

Without our collection, we would not be able to create exhibits that uniquely explore Saginaw County’s rich history.



In 2018, objects were critical in enabling us to develop our new lumbering and logging gallery. Also, the breadth of the collection was showcased in the exhibits “Stories from Saginaw County’s Attic” and “On the Home Front.” While exhibits may be the most visible use of our collection, it also serves as a foundation for programs and resources for the entire community.

During the past year, architectural drawings from our collection were consulted by architects and homeowners restoring buildings in the area. In the creation of the new SVRC marketplace, plans and documents preserved by the museum were utilized by the architects working on the building, and historic images from our archives are displayed in the marketplace’s entrance.

PARTNERING WITH *Saginaw County Sports*

Since January 2011, Saginaw County Sports Hall of Fame has partnered with us to showcase sports memorabilia from individuals and organizations in Saginaw County.

This year was very productive for the Saginaw County Sports Hall of Fame. The organization inducted the Class of 2018 in November which included: the 1999 Saginaw High Football team, Stuart Schweiggert, Danielle (Kamm) Carter, and six other deserving individuals.

There were some great artifacts donated as well. This includes: Terrance Roberson's Fresno State basketball uniform, some letter sweaters, programs related to the Saginaw Gears and much more.

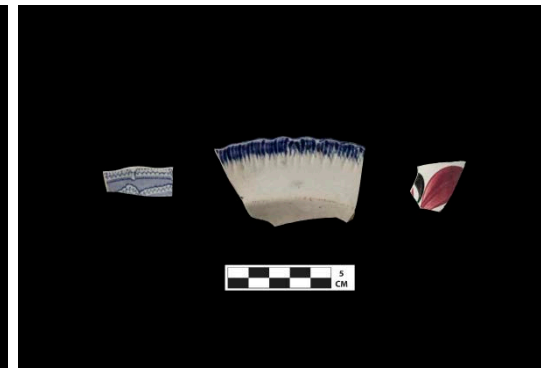

DISCOVERIES IN *The Field*

We've wrapped up another field season at the Steltzriede Farm site in Saginaw Township and, in terms of area excavated, it was the biggest one yet! This year, the Castle Museum archaeology team excavated 13 1X1 meter excavation units. This compares with 11 in 2015, 10 in 2016, and six in 2017.

During the 2018 field season, we worked in two areas of the site. We spent the first part of the field season expanding our excavation in the "cabin area" where we had previously found the cellar of the Steltzriede's original house/cabin. The season started out with a bang when, much to our surprise, we found a ca. 9,000 year-old spear point! Things quickly returned to normal and we began finding the usual array of square nails, chinking, ceramic sherds, and brick fragments



along with pieces of window glass, glass vessels, bones, a clay smoking pipe, and even a slate pencil.



The second half of the field season was spent excavating a 2X5 meter excavation block in the yard area between the cellar and the still-standing 1848 frame house. Shovel-testing in 2017 indicated the

presence of early to mid-19th century (and more recent) material in the general area. We were hoping to find midden deposits or a well, privy, or other feature associated with the early-mid 19th century period of the Steltzriede occupation. In addition, we were hoping to learn more about the timing and extent of landscape modification - fill deposition across the site.

Unfortunately, features and dense midden deposits were not to be found. Instead, we uncovered a light scatter of mid-19th through 20th century debris across the area. Bricks and



nails were especially common, but we also found ceramics, bottle fragments, lead shot, another slate pencil, a button or collar stud, and lots of bone fragments from cows, pigs, and even a cat!

In terms of identifying changes in the site's landscape during the 19th and 20th centuries, we had some success - assuming our current interpretations prove correct! Wall profiles in the yard area show the extent of a probable mid-20th century deposit of clay and gravel fill that appears to have been used to level the yard. Immediately below the clay and gravel fill is a thick layer of sand, possibly derived from digging the basement under the frame house in the mid-late 19th century. The surface of this second fill layer was stable and exposed long enough to begin forming a dark topsoil. The bottom of the second fill layer merges with what is probably the disturbed (plowed) early to mid-19th century surface over a natural, relatively undisturbed, soil profile.

Our attention now turns to the lab where we have already begun processing artifacts from this year's excavation. We have many hours of sorting, washing, cataloguing, and analysis ahead of us. A lot to look forward to!

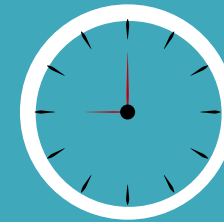

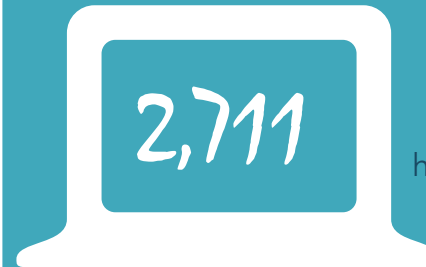

INTERN HIGHLIGHTS <<<

In addition to the efforts of our dedicated volunteers, 15 students from various schools: Delta College, Michigan & Saginaw Valley State University as well as Freeland & Nouvel High School assisted us in cataloging our collections. Specifically, three student interns developed and completed projects that uniquely utilized the museum's collection and helped us complete important work.



Travis Faustin, a senior at Saginaw Valley State University, helped organize and catalogue the museum's archives. This project has allowed us to better understand and preserve the HSSC's history. He also researched early land patents in Saginaw County. That information will be used in a new gallery opening in 2019.

Nikki M. Urse, a senior at Saginaw Valley State University, researched and catalogued a collection of 700 postcards. 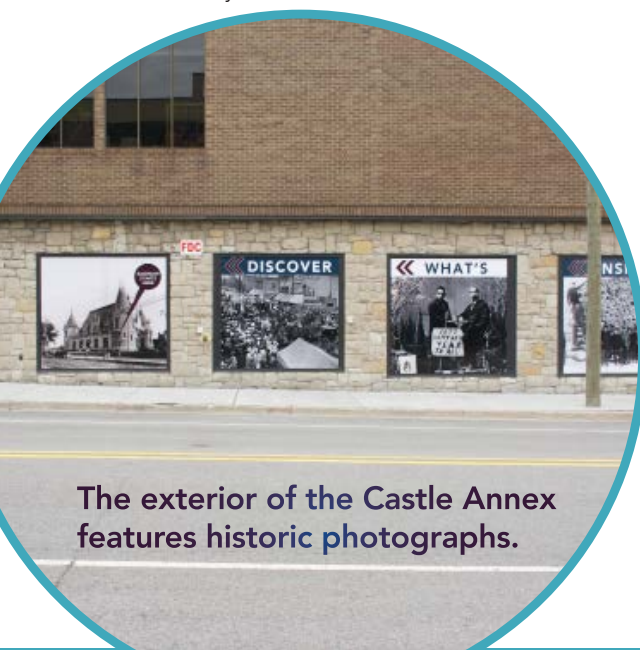
